STRONG POINTS

There is not much that Williams does not possess as a strength in his game. He is an extremely gifted defensive lineman that possesses the length, athleticism, and elite power that NFL teams salivate over. He is a massive man with great metrics. Even with that being said, he has a frame that is able to hold more weight and muscle. He showed his versatility as he lined up just about everywhere along the defensive line at some point in his career. He is able to manhandle offensive linemen with his violent hand usage and is extremely hard to redirect for offensive linemen once he gets going downhill. He gets good leverage on blockers at the point of attack and once he solidifies that there is no stopping him. He is rarely moved by offensive linemen, as he is the one seen doing most of the moving of offensive linemen. He does a good job as a read-and-react two-gapper and will be patient in allowing RB's find their lane before throwing blockers at will when he is ready to track a ball carrier and blow him up. He will win in every one-on-one battle. He does a good job of staying low in his get off and will play with good pad level in the run game. By playing with low pad level he is able to make the difficult goal line stops that he ends up making. He has rare foot quickness as well as natural force to recover and get back into a play after being beaten. He is an extremely explosive and dangerous pass rusher due to his closing burst and his nose for the QB. He has began to develop a repertoire of rush moves including a devastating swim move as well as a spin move as pass rush counter.

WEAKNESSES

Williams is a rare talent. Therefore, he does not have many weaknesses when watching his game. One thing that I will say is that he does not always finish plays and lacks pursuit when plays tend to head opposite of him. However, in 2014 he made a better effort at competing till the play was dead. He is still raw as he is only 20 years of age. I do not know if I should consider that a strength or a weakness, as he has plenty of time to develop and form a dominating long career. He tends to rely sometimes on his physical tools instead of using his skill. Other than this, I cannot think of anything else that would be considered a weakness within his game.

SUMMARY

Williams is my undisputed #1 player in this draft class as he is a rare talent that you only see come around once in a decade or two. He is the highest graded player I have ever evaluated and I even think more highly of Williams then I did Clowney and Suh as prospects. He is an incredibly disruptive defensive lineman that uses his athleticism, both in the pass and run game. He is extremely powerful and possesses elite hand usage in which he is able to toss offensive linemen around all over the field. With that being said, he does an

excellent job of disengaging from blockers. He will win at ease when in one-on-one situations, being the reason why he is typically double and even tripled teamed. He drew the double team consistently and he is not even a nose tackle. With that being said, you can expect him to get double teamed at the next level, as this man is a load for opposing offensive lines. He was unable to get a good feel for how productive he could have been if more talent surrounded him, which he will have by his side in the NFL. When studying his tape from 2014, it almost seems as if he had been watching tape on J.J. Watt over the 2013 offseason because he elevated his game to a whole new level, and was reading the QB better as well as batting down balls. In 2014, he lined up more as a 3-4 DE and he looked more of a threat from a pass rush standpoint. In 2014 he also finished plays more consistently and developed a larger repertoire of pass rush moves. He will drive through linemen in the run game to get to the ball carrier. With that being said, Williams will be able to play as a 4-3 DT or a 3-4 DE and could essentially fit on any team, as there is not any team out there that would not love to have a player of his caliber. I see him as a dominant player, playing on any front, but I feel that he would be more effective as a pass rusher from the 3-4 DE position. Just to clear it up one more time, this is an extremely rare talent and I would take him with the first pick as I have him as my #1 player in this class and project him as a top 3 talent. However, it is unlikely the Buccaneers take him with the first pick as they are in desperate need for a QB, so that leaves the Titans at #2, where I think he would fit in perfectly coming off the end next to Jurrell Casey in the Titans 3-4 scheme. If the Titans end up trading down to a team that is in love with Marcus Mariota then you can expect either the Jaguars at #3 or the Raiders at #4 to select him to plug into their 4-3 DT spot. He will not be on the board past #4 so the teams picking after the Raiders should not get their hopes up unless they are willing to trade up to secure the rights to this freak of a prospect. I personally do not think any of these teams should pass on him except for maybe the Buccaneers. With next level coaching and more experience. Williams should be able to put together a Pro Bowl career and eventually end up in Canton as he reminds me mostly of Richard Seymour in the way he plays the game. This is a once in a decade or two type of player so if I am any team I am trying to get my hands on him.
